1. Purpose & Principles

Voluntary participation, equality of Nations, sovereignty preserved and constitutional integrity.

2. Admission & Assessment

Eligibility, application requirements, National Registry assessment and constitutional determination.

3. Recognition & Records

Register of Participating Nations, recognition certificates, archives and certified copies.

4. Nation Lore & Continuity

Nation-controlled Lore authority and departments, withdrawal, amendments and enduring recognition.

PREAMBLE

Purpose: Voluntary, Sovereign, Enduring

Voluntary by Nature

Participation is described as an act of sovereign will. A Nation is not compelled to apply, remain, or accept conditions that diminish its authority. Withdrawal is available without penalty under the Framework.

Sovereignty Preserved

The Framework says the Confederation does not create or grant sovereignty. Each Nation carries its own authority, genealogy, Lore and identity independently and prior to the Framework.

Enduring Instrument

The Framework is designed to operate across generations and to be interpreted through Natural Equity, mutual respect and the original intent of the founding Nations.

Core mission: cooperation for peace, cultural preservation, self-determined economic development and enduring wellbeing.

GUIDING PRINCIPLES

Constitutional Foundations

The source describes these principles as binding on decisions made under the Framework.



Voluntary Participation

Free and informed participation from inquiry through admission, with no compulsory surrender of sovereignty.

Equality of Nations

Applications are to be assessed fairly and consistently; Nation size, population, territory or economic capacity should not determine outcome.

Constitutional Integrity

The Framework is to be read with the Confederation’s other constitutional instruments, with protection of Nation sovereignty and rights central to conflict resolution.

PROCESS

From Nation Application to Recognition

The Framework sets out a staged pathway rather than automatic admission.



PART II - ADMISSION

Eligibility & Application Requirements

PART II — ADMISSION

Eligibility and Application Process

A Nation may apply for admission where it identifies as a distinct Nation or Original People, possesses its own governance or recognised constitutional authority, and voluntarily seeks participation.

Application Requirements and Process

Every application shall be submitted to the National Registry using the prescribed Participating Nation Admission Application and Declaration, and shall include the following where applicable.

Official and traditional name of the Nation, and principal place of administration.	Names and contact details of authorised representatives.	Supporting constitutional or governance information and documents.
Signed Declaration confirming voluntary and authorised application.	Any additional information reasonably required by the National Registry.	Historical, genealogical, cultural, or territorial information where the Nation wishes to provide it.

Nation identity

Official and traditional Nation name and principal place of administration.

Authorised representatives

Names and contact details of people authorised to act for the applicant Nation.

Governance information

Supporting constitutional or governance information and documents, where applicable.

Declaration & supporting material

Signed voluntary-authority declaration, Registry-requested information, and optional historical, genealogical, cultural or territorial information.

PART III — ASSESSMENT

Assessment and Constitutional Determination



National Registry Assessment

The National Registry shall assess every application impartially and consistently, examining all documents, consulting with the applicant Nation, and preparing an Admission Assessment Report with findings and recommendations.

Constitutional Determination

The Admission Assessment Report is submitted to the appropriate constitutional authority, which may approve, defer, or decline the application. Where cultural or Lore authority is concerned, the Nation's own recognised authority is consulted.

Notice of Determination

Following determination, the National Registry notifies the applicant Nation in writing of the outcome, including the decision, effective date, any conditions, and reasons where an application is deferred or declined.

National Registry Assessment

Impartial and consistent examination of documents, consultation with the applicant Nation, and preparation of findings and recommendations.

Constitutional Determination

Assessment report goes to the appropriate constitutional authority, which may approve, defer or decline. Nation Lore authority is consulted where relevant.

Notice of Determination

Written outcome includes the decision, effective date, any conditions, and reasons where an application is deferred or declined.

PART IV — RECOGNITION

Registration, Certification and Records



Register of Participating Nations

The National Registry shall establish and maintain the official Register recording all Nations admitted to the Republic, including reference numbers, date of admission, and status.



Certificate of Recognition

Following admission, the National Registry issues a Certificate of Recognition constituting official evidence of the Nation's admission as a Participating Nation.



Constitutional Archives

All records — applications, declarations, assessments, determinations, and certificates — are maintained accurately, securely, and permanently within the Constitutional Archives.



Certified Copies

The National Registry may issue certified copies of any constitutional record, which shall constitute official constitutional records of the Republic.

Admission confirms the Nation's voluntary participation within the constitutional framework of the Republic. It shall not create, diminish, transfer, extinguish, replace, or otherwise affect the sovereignty, identity, governance, constitutional authority, territories, genealogy, culture, traditions, rights, or responsibilities of the Participating Nation.

Register of Participating Nations

Official register records admitted Nations, reference numbers, admission dates and status.

Certificate of Recognition

Issued following admission as evidence of admission as a Participating Nation under the Framework.

Constitutional Archives

Applications, declarations, assessments, determinations and certificates are maintained as permanent records.

Certified Copies

The National Registry may issue certified copies of constitutional records.

Key safeguard: admission is stated not to create, diminish, transfer, extinguish or replace a Nation’s sovereignty, identity, governance, authority, territories, genealogy, culture, traditions, rights or responsibilities.

Nation Lore, Departments & Self-Independence

PART IV-A — NATION LORE AND DEPARTMENTS

Self-Independence and Sustainability

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Lore Men and Lore Women Authority

Each Participating Nation may establish a Lore Men and Lore Women Area within its own governance. The Republic shall respect cultural restrictions, confidentiality, and gender-specific knowledge. Nothing in this Framework authorises the Republic to appoint, remove, or override recognised Lore authorities.
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Nation Departments

Each Participating Nation may establish departments — including Lore and Culture, Governance, Treasury, Health, Education, Country and Waters, and many others — under its own Constitution, Lore, Law, customs, or recognised governing processes.
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Republic Support Without Control

At a Nation's request, the Republic may assist with templates, training, technical systems, and shared services. Such support shall not create ownership, control, guardianship, or superior authority over the Nation, its departments, assets, or People.

Lore Men & Lore Women Authority

A Participating Nation may establish its own Lore Men and Lore Women area. The Framework says cultural restrictions, confidentiality and gender-specific knowledge are to be respected.

Nation Departments

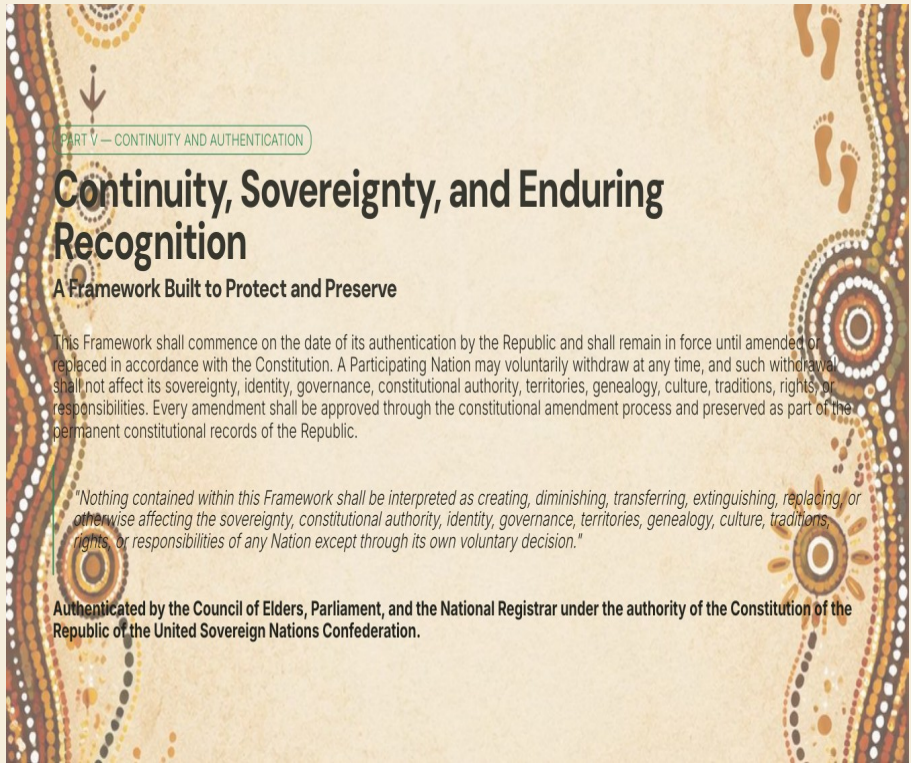
Nations may establish their own departments, including Lore and Culture, Governance, Treasury, Health, Education, Country and Waters, and others.

Support Without Control

At a Nation's request, the Confederation may assist with templates, training, technical systems and shared services. The source says such support does not create ownership, control, guardianship or superior authority over the Nation, its departments, assets or People.

PART V

Continuity, Sovereignty & Enduring Recognition



Continuity

The Framework commences on authentication and remains until amended or replaced under its constitutional process.

Withdrawal

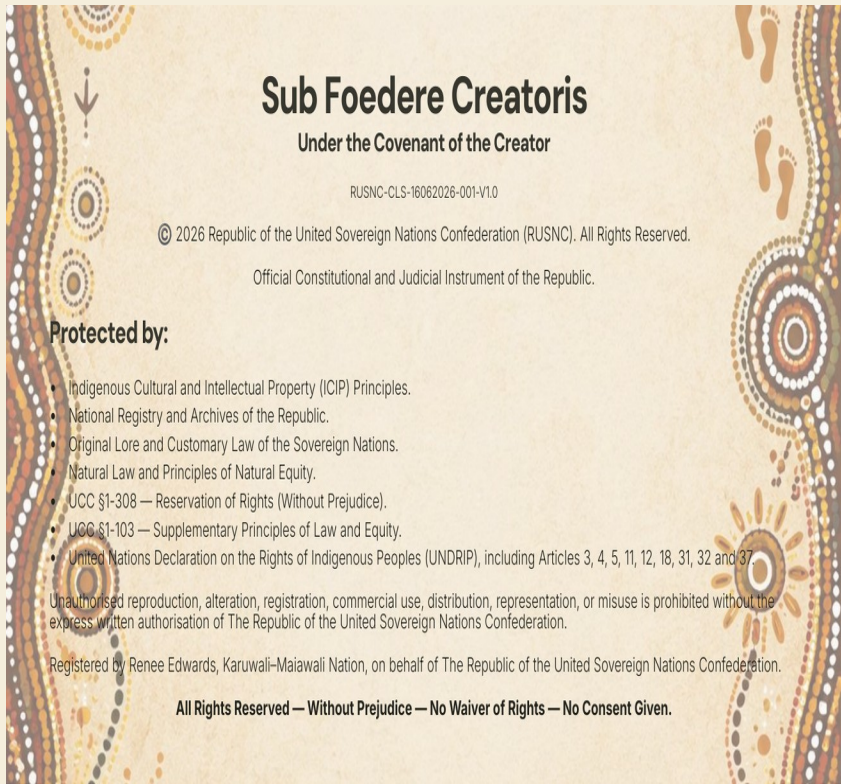
A Participating Nation may voluntarily withdraw; the source says withdrawal does not affect the Nation's sovereignty, identity, governance, authority, territories, genealogy, culture, traditions, rights or responsibilities.

Amendment & Permanent Record

Amendments are to follow the constitutional amendment process and be preserved as permanent constitutional records. The Framework's stated interpretive safeguard is that Nation rights are not created, diminished, transferred, extinguished or replaced except through the Nation's own voluntary decision.

What a Nation would prepare next

A practical checklist drawn from the admission and assessment sections of the supplied Framework.

- 1 Confirm the Nation's voluntary decision and authorised process to apply.
- 2 Prepare official/traditional Nation name and administration details.
- 3 Identify authorised representatives and contact details.
- 4 Gather constitutional/governance documents and any optional historical, genealogical, cultural or territorial material.
- 5 Complete the prescribed admission application and declaration.
- 6 Respond to National Registry consultation or requests for additional information.
- 7 Receive the constitutional determination and, if admitted, the registration and recognition records.
